Music series venue shifts

For fall 2012, the Bena Music Series will morph into the "Beyond Bena Music Series," shifting to the Gloucester Courthouse area and leading off on Saturday, September 22, with Americana star Angela Easterling. The show will be held at Arts on Main at 6580-B Main Street in Gloucester.

Easterling has been a finalist at the nation's top two folk music festivals, the Kerrville New Folk Festival in Texas and the Telluride Bluegrass Festival in Colorado. The up-and-coming singer's albums have consistently charted on national Americana billboard charts.

Upcoming shows include The Stray Birds November 3, Shane Cooley November 17 and The Honey Dewdrops December 1 (venue to be announced).

The Bena Music Series began in 2009 at the Bena Country Store, hosting original music Americana-folk-bluegrass acts. The shift to the Gloucester Courthouse area coincides with the growth of the music series, said founder John Warren.

Lancaster Players will stage 'The Kitchen Witches'

"The Kitchen Witches," by Caroline Smith, will be presented by The Lancaster Players in October.

This show focuses on a pair of women to whom some in the audience might easily relate, said director Donna Smith. Dolly Biddle (Judy Ebner) and Isobel Lomax (Beverly Hammond) are two strong-willed females who share three things: a love of cooking, a deep-seeded hatred for each other, and at one point in their past - a man.

What was to be Dolly's final show is interrupted by a member of the audience—Isobel. The delicate gloves of femininity are thrown aside while the proverbial bell rings signifying the beginning of what will be a battle royal between these two culinary queens, said Smith.

Within a matter of seconds Dolly and Isobel begin to air out 30 years of dirty laundry on live television as poor Stephanie (Susan Robertson) tries desperately to maintain order. Stephanie is Dolly's daughter and the producer of the TV show.

All the while, Rob the camera man (Paul Vernon) is catching it all on film. Phone calls flood the studio requesting that rather than cancel Dolly's show, why not create a new show featuring both women, continued Smith. As the knives, spatulas and globs of food fly, Dolly and Isobel rediscover their friendship, lay down their arms and soon realize they have a fourth thing in common.

Reflections

Homecoming

Homecoming is a word that bespeaks of who we are as Baptists. We believe that from the invitation of the Lord Jesus to follow Him, and our positive acceptance to that call, that we are heaven-bound for an eternal homecoming at the close of our earthly trek. It is a journey and a quest that we proudly call our pilgrim's highway.

Maybe that is why a homecoming in our local churches is such a sweet and important occurrence. Some churches celebrate annually, while others choose significant anniversaries.

Colonial America's religious life originally belonged to the established Church of England. After the 1700s closing of most Episcopal churches in Virginia, Baptists began a resurgence from the earlier days when our ministers were imprisoned for preaching without a license.

Here, as in other places in America, itinerant ministers went briskly about from forest stages, meeting halls, steamboat wharves and public houses, proclaiming the gospel. On the Northern Neck, the Revs. Addison Hall, A. B. Dunaway, Fred W. Claybrook and a few others held forth whenever-wherever they could obtain an audience holy.

History records that the Corrotoman Church, like so many other fine local congregations, began as a preaching station. It first formed under the leadership of the Lebanon Church, still later the Morattico Church, as the Emaus Church on September 4, 1841, at what was then known as Payne's Shop (Payne's Crossroads). It was a village declined in population from 1825 when it had a post office, several dwellings, a blacksmith's shop, two boot and shoe factories, a school and church. The church name was formally changed to Corrotoman and became part of a four-point charge, yoked with the Norwood, Lebanon and Providence Baptist churches.

The first Ottoman Church house was built in 1834, and replaced by an 1846 structure. In the winter of 1861-62, it was also used to house Confederate soldiers. The next house of worship was built under the leadership of Claybrook (first official pastor, 1876-1886). So keen was the enthusiasm and faithfulness of those dedicated folks, that the flock quickly outgrew the facility.

On June 1, 1960, the Rev. Mr. Roy C. Whitescarver (the first full-time pastor, 1956-1961) led the congregation into going solo, leaving the charge with the other three congregations.

The present sanctuary was built in 1904, with an addition in 1954 and has undergone further additions and renovation as needed.

Over the 125-year span, the church actually has had two dozen or so full- and part-time pastors serving the flock. Presently the Rev. Mr. David Comer, former U.S. Navy Chaplain, is

pastor. An early parsonage was behind the church on Ottoman Ferry Road, across from what I remember as Bernard Keyser's (now Reynolds) garage. In the fall of 1960, a new parsonage was built on the shore of Meyers Creek, sitting broad-across the creek from Saunders Boat Yard, which is now the Yankee Point Marina. From that home, boat views across the creek and water views straight down creek, out into the wide Corrotoman Bay, are equally breathtaking.

The house was constructed with funds generated from the sale of financial bonds. The home was first occupied by pastor Whitescarver and his family. On January 24 (coincidentally, my birthday) of 1965, under the leadership of Pastor Wayne E. Varner (1962-1968), the dwelling was declared debt-free.

Three gentlemen of the congregation have been licensed into full-time ministry: Fuller B. Saunders (1941), Donald Keyser (1942) and Kenny Riggins (1985). In addition, Miss Amy Jenkins left Corrotoman, commissioned in 1987 as a missionary by the Baptist Foreign Mission Board (now International Mission Board), to serve as minister of music and youth in Cowdenbeath and Lochgelly, Scotland.

Saunders and Riggins followed pastoral paths while Keyser spent most of his ministry teaching.

Amy Jenkins found a lad over in Scotland, married him and is raising her family there.

The Corrotoman Baptist Church, at Ottoman Ferry and River roads, celebrated its anniversary with a Homecoming on Sunday, September 16, 2012. The congregation welcomed former pastor Greg McClain back as guest preacher. Over 200 attended the day's festive celebration.

Church historian Patsy Harcum McCarty-Bryan was able to gather together many historical items, most especially a plethora of cherished photographs, so that they would be displayed. She, as usual, was incredibly successful.

As a lad, I first attended Corrotoman in the 1950s when my parents bought a river cottage at the old Cowshed in Millenbeck (Slabtown). Had not the Irvington Church extended a pastoral call to me in 1986, Corrotoman, the church of my summer youth, would quite possibly have been my local "retirement home-church." There are a few folks whom I fondly remember from days of old there still; I pray it is reciprocal. Both my son, R. Lee Farmer, pastor of Coan Baptist Church, and I have been privileged to hold occasional revivals, supply preaching, song services and funerals there since 1978.
