positions until his retirement Units of the U.S. and the United Kingdom for over 10 years.

He was appointed director of the U.S. Federal Air Marshal Service, Department of Homeland Security, in January 2002, shortly after the tragic events of 9/11, and retired in February 2006, continued Weekley.

As director, he was responsible for the unprecedented standup of today's Federal Air Marshal Service and was one of the principal executives in the creation of the Transportation Security Administration, the Military Counter-Terrorist where he worked closely with the Datamaxx Group.

Quinn holds a bachelor's in business administration from the University of Maryland and is a graduate of the National War College, National Defense University. 
